David Young Provides Legacy of Care

During the recent Annual Meeting, Dr. Richard Young announced a \$1 million bequest to UCP/CLASS from his late son David's estate. David, a long-time consumer of UCP/CLASS services, also included an additional \$10,000 gift to benefit Centre Services. David's bequest is the largest gift that UCP/CLASS has ever received.

David Young began receiving services from UCP/CLASS in the late 1980s through Centre Services and the Howard Whitehouse Center. Throughout his involvement with UCP/CLASS, David enjoyed taking a variety of classes that allowed him to utilize his communication device to express his ideas and opinions. It was through these classes that he met his best friend and long-time roommate John Pfab.

A gifted visionary, David collaborated on one of the original Minspeak Communication devices, including developing a lei icon signifying Minspeak's brand. David enjoyed public

*A message from UCP/CLASS
CEO, Dr. Al Condeluci*

It was in the spring of 1951, when a band of family members (mostly mothers) got together to voice challenges to the advice they were getting about the future of their children. These families had youngsters who had significant disabilities associated with cerebral palsy.

The advice they were hearing was harsh. "Consider putting your child into a nice institution, they will be better off there." And; "Don't expect much from your child, they probably won't live that long anyway."

These courageous families would not buy this advice, even from well-respected physicians and experts. They knew there could be more; they knew there had to be more. They believed then that we could build a community where everyone belonged.

And so they set out to create an organization to challenge these assumptions, and by the fall of 1951, UCP of the Pittsburgh District was born.

Now, 60 years later, we, you and me, are the stewards of this vision, "a community where each belongs" and it is glowing as bright as ever.

Consider these facts:

- Today, UCP/CLASS serves over 4,000 men, women, children, and their families who are experiencing all types of disabilities.
- We make payroll for some 700 staff that provide these services and supports, and our reach extends all the way to Erie, PA.
- We are nationally, dare I say internationally, recognized as a leader in the process of community building and have won awards and praises to this end.
- We have twice been selected as one of the best places to work in Western Pennsylvania and are sought after by folks in all sectors of community as a beacon for full and inclusive opportunity.
- We have two amazing Centre's – a community service in Oakland, a community building in Swissvale.
- We have had leadership continuity on both the staff and board that is unparalleled in human services today.
- We have strong relationships with the Universities and Colleges in the region.
- We have strong and valued partnerships with the United Way of Allegheny County, the Department of Human Services in Allegheny County, the Foundation community, the Corporate community, and the private sector.

All of this has been developed from the dreams and aspirations of visionary family leaders who refused to be told that there were no possibilities. For the story of UCP/CLASS is the story of dreams coming true. It is the story of the human spirit. It is the story of vision and possibilities.

And the story continues.

Let's Get Healthy Together

On Tuesday, April 26, 2011, UCP/CLASS' Safety Committee sponsored the First Annual Employee Health Fair. A total of 17 vendors participated in the event; providing staff with a variety of resources and information regarding more healthy living. The committee sponsored the event to promote ways in which staff could increase their healthy habits and learn more about their personal health.

Those who attended had the opportunity to be treated to a relaxing massage provided by Choice Chiropractic and Wellness Center. Employees could have their bone density checked and were given information on how to increase bone density. For example, if their density was found to be below average, employees were told to eat leafy green vegetables and foods rich in calcium; among other tips to prevent the onset of osteoporosis. Smokers had the option to receive Carbon Monoxide readings from the American Respiratory Alliance. Baxter was on site to provide blood tests to screen employees for Alpha-1, a genetic disorder that may lead to lung or liver disease and the YMCA helped employees determine their blood pressure

and their body fat percentage. A hands-on demonstration was given by the Giant Eagle Market District showing participants how to make a healthy salad with quinoa. Individuals learned about quinoa (a healthy grain), how to choose and slice mangoes, prepare avocado, and make their own salad dressing.

Other vendors utilized by UCP/CLASS who participated in the First Annual Employee Health Fair included: United Concordia Dental Services, Assurant Life Insurance, Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield Health Insurance, and Enscoe Long Insurance Group. Representatives from each company were available to answer questions and provide information about benefit coverage.

The First Annual Employee Health Fair was successful with nearly 75 employees in attendance. The safety committee will be planning a Second Annual Employee Health Fair to be held in 2012.

Community Support

Kristy Trautmann, Executive Director of FISA Foundation, delivered the keynote speech. Ms. Trautmann commended UCP/CLASS on its 60 years of

Noting the importance of a strong case for support, she also spoke on the need for focusing on consumer outcomes and adherence to mission objectives. CEO Al Condeluci expressed his thanks to Ms. Trautmann for her presentation and the important support FISA Foundation has provided to UCP/CLASS over the years.

UCP/CLASS Residential Program Wins Housing Award

On Wednesday, June 22, 2011 UCP/CLASS received the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Supportive Housing Award during the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Authority's (PHFA) Housing Services conference held in State College, Pennsylvania. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Supportive Housing award is described as "an award that recognizes successful initiatives and honors the leadership and dedication of individuals and organizations who increase housing opportunities. Furthermore the individuals and organizations have played a leadership role in the creation of housing that is accessible, affordable and maximizes availability of services to people who need them. The effectiveness of supportive housing depends on the willingness to take risks and experiment with new models, approaches, and strategies".

Nominated by Steve Chupinka, owner of K&S Real Estate, UCP/CLASS was chosen because of their long-standing history of providing community residential supports to people with disabilities who want to live more independently in the community. Currently UCP/CLASS provides services to 60 people with disabilities living in Allegheny County. Darla Lynn, Chief Residential Officer, states, "We are very honored and humbled by this acknowledgement of our work in assisting the individuals we support to get what we all want – a place to call home." Ms. Lynn also noted, "Since

the early 1990's I have had the pleasure and privilege of being a part of assisting individuals who were previously institutionalized to become home owners and to move from group homes to homes/apartments of their own. One of the most rewarding days was when my team and I moved 17 individuals to homes and apartments of their choice."

Affordable accessible housing is one of the most daunting obstacles that people with disabilities face in today's society. With only 37% of this group being employed and with limited resources provided to them by Social Security, affordable, accessible housing is only a dream for most. UCP/CLASS has made this issue a priority. New advances in environmental technology create accessible housing for residents by providing advanced safety measures that can support activities that occur in the house to provide a safe and supportive atmosphere. From an organizational effectiveness standpoint, it allows staff to work more strategically by having individuals living in a home with peers of their choice with the latest in advanced technology and home security devices. It also provides a significant savings on staffing costs by consolidating services to one site, an improved level of living and support services for participants, the building of more inclusive communities, a sound financial investment for UCP/CLASS, and the sense of self esteem and pride through living in a community of one's choice.

UCP/CLASS' Home Ownership Program began in 1995 when two individuals, previously living in an institution, were able to move into a rental property until they were able to choose a lot for a home they would own together. With fundraising efforts from a fraternity at the University of Pittsburgh, the two individuals were able to purchase a lot to build a home. UCP/CLASS, along with assistance of a construction company, local bank, and a board

In 2007, UCP/CLASS joined with Blue Roof Solutions to build a SMART™ home in the suburbs of North Versailles. With centrally controlled thermostats, automatic doors, motion-sensored lighting and other SMART™ technologies this became home to three other individuals. Financing for this home was made possible through a 0% interest loan from the Ewing Trust Fund operated by UCP National. Additionally a second ranch-style home was purchase and renovated in the Pleasant Hills area as a result of favorable financing from a local bank. Three people call this their home.

member (who happened to own a construction materials company), was able to build a fully accessible home was built in a suburb east of Pittsburgh.

In 1996, UCP/CLASS assisted two more individuals who wanted to purchase and renovate a ranch style home. A group of local volunteers provided the materials to make the repairs and renovations which made the home more accessible.

A third accessible home was built in the McKeesport area in 1999 with financing through the county, known as the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). UCP/CLASS built two accessible homes in the suburbs of Penn Hills with HUD section 811 funding. These homes now provide affordable, accessible, supportive rental housing to six individuals. ACTION housing serves as the landlord for the tenants and UCP/CLASS provides the staff supports needed.

UCP/CLASS' most recent home ownership endeavor was in 2010. In conjunction with K&S realty, UCP/CLASS constructed two homes using technology similar to the SMART™ technology utilized in 2007. These homes built in the Munhall area are located in a new mixed use development of accessible patio homes that includes both market-rate owned housing and affordable rental housing, all constructed according to universal design and owner specifications. The funding for these homes came from a second 0% interest loan from the Ewing Trust Fund

associated with UCP National and generous donations from two Pittsburgh-area foundations.

UCP/CLASS' mission of, "Working Toward a Community Where Each Belongs" is evident through their commitment to assisting individuals with disabilities obtain affordable, accessible housing. As Darla Lynn, Chief Residential Officer, so eloquently remarked in her acknowledgement speech, "We are blessed to work for an agency like UCP/CLASS that not only permits us to think outside the box and take chances but encourages us to do so."

Exercise and Inspiration: A Story of the MSES Program

The Multiple Sclerosis Service Society's Exercise and Support (MSES) Program has many benefits to those individuals participating in the program. The success of the program is principally due to the staff members from Multiple Sclerosis Service Society (MSSS) who have formed trusting and caring relationships with the people they support.

When Simone Simon was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis in 2001, she was unaware of what challenges the future would bring. Working as a check processor at PNC Bank, Simone first began having trouble with her vision and balance. After ten years of living with Multiple Sclerosis, Simone had several relapses and by 2010 she was barely able to move her legs. Her mother saw an article about the MSES program in a doctor's office and immediately contacted the MSSS. It was then she learned about the program and the benefits it could provide her.

The MSES Program provides regular in-home visits to people living with Multiple Sclerosis who have difficulty leaving their homes. The MSES staff, working under a doctor's prescription, address overall physical functioning. The program is a one of a kind exercise program, which provides exercises, stretching, and range of motion exercise to help the client maintain their current level of function both safely and comfortably. The staff educates clients about adaptive and durable medical equipment, a home exercise program, and safety concerns. The MSES staff provide this program to individuals in Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Fayette, Greene, Lawrence, Washington and Westmoreland counties

Regarding the program, Simone shares, "The call my mother made was the best call she ever made." Simone has been participating in the program for almost a year and in her words believes, "finding this program was a miracle". With a supportive circle of family and friends that include her husband, Robert, two children Rob and Rickea, her mother Maryann and a close friend Colleen; Simone credits them for her ability to "beat MS by surrounding yourself with positive people." Simone's six-year old grandson Nydir will at times participate in the exercise program by getting on the floor and encouraging her to complete her exercises.

Simone looks forward to her exercise program. After years of being told by doctors that she needed to exercise, she is finally able to achieve this goal through the support of staff from the MSES Program. Simone is extremely appreciative of the MSES program and the staff who assist her.

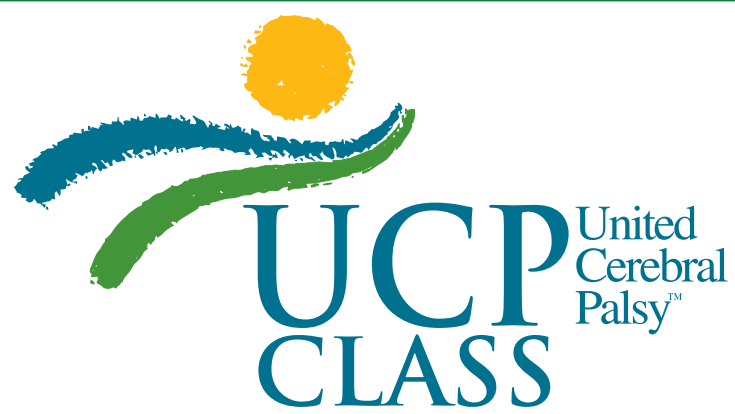
